BCPSEA Responses to BCTF and Local Teachers' Association Statements

BCTF School Staff Alert #79, May 31, 2006

BCTF Statement

According to the Minister of Education, there is no teacher shortage now or on the horizon because enrolment is declining. In the "Education Report" of May 24, 2006, Bond states, "That means there is no general shortage of teachers—and we don't anticipate that changing." The minister claims that "We currently have about 1,200 teacher retirements a year."

The following is the number of retirements that have taken place since 1991.

BCPSEA Response

The **figures** at left provided by the Teachers' Pension Plan and utilized by the BCTF **include all educators**, **not just teachers**. These figures include retirements of:

- principals and vice-principals
- teachers-on call
- superintendents
- assistant superintendents
- associated professionals, and
- professionals who are appointed by a board of school trustees in the British Columbia public school system.

The student-aged population is projected to continue to decline generally across the province for the next several years.

According to the Teachers' Pension Plan, the average retirement age of educators in the BC public school system is 58. Commencing with the 2005-2006 school year, the average age of educators is declining and is projected to continue to decline, which will result in fewer retirements.

When student enrolment projections are considered along with educator retirement projections, it becomes evident that there is no projected general teacher shortage.
